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

President's Message

We have had a great month of fine weather. Many of our plants have recovered from the snow and cold that has been with us up until mid April. The rhododendrons at VanDusen have been flowering profusely these last few weeks. I am particularly pleased with the abundance of flowers on *R. forrestii*. The waxy, deep satin-red flowers were massed on all our plants. *Rhododendron thomsonii* is one of the best plants, with wonderful deep red flowers and peeling bark that leaves a jigsaw pattern on trunks and older stems. It is a choice plant for a protected area in the garden.

May I remind the members that the monthly meeting in May will be held at the David C. Lam Asian Garden at UBC Botanical Garden. Please feel free to come early and bring a picnic dinner to enjoy in the garden. The Curator, Peter Wharton, has created one of the finest collections of Asian plants outside of China. The rhododendrons have been amassed from material originating from collections made in the 1930s and 40s by those such as Kingdon Ward and Forrest. There are also several rhododendron species new to cultivation that Peter is growing, which will be the highlight of



collections in years to come. We welcome the opportunity to enjoy and benefit from the knowledge and hard work of a superb plantsman.

Joe Ronsley has organized an excellent selection of members' gardens for this year's garden tours. Many of us use this opportunity to gather ideas and exchange our knowledge with others who have like interests. I understand that Joe has also requested that the weather co-operate throughout the tours.

The rhododendron is a very ancient

plant, and fossil remains show that certain species date back to the Miocene Era. The first rhododendrons mentioned in old texts are R. *ferrugineum* and R. *hirsutum*, both indigenous to Europe. During the 16th Century, botanists use numerous other names to describe rhododendrons, such as *Ledum* or *Cistus*; and *Chamaecistus* was used by Clusius. The name *Rhododendron* appears to have been given to the genus by Andrea Cesalpino in 1583.

Directions to Lions Bay Gardens:

For all three gardens, turn off the Squamish Highway (Hwy 99) at the second turn-off in Lions Bay, where the sign points to Oceanview Road.

For the Mossakowski and Ronsley gardens, follow Oceanview Road up and to the right, to the T, with Highview Place going to the left and Oceanview continuing to the right. Left for Mossakowski, to 155, right for Ronsley, to 250.

For the Ganske garden, cross the little bridge to the left soon after turning off the highway. At the T, turn right on to Centre Road. At the next T (very short distance), turn left on to Bayview Road. Continue on Bayview for a considerable distance to the next T, which is Mountain Drive. Turn right to 360



The April Sisters by Bill Spohn

There is something especially pleasant about the early blooming hybrids that bring cheer and hope to the garden after the long winter. This note is about two hybrids, both of which are rated by Greer as triple 4's (1 is the lowest, 5 the highest, and they indicate flower, plant and performance, in that order), in other words, he likes them!

They are both hybridized by Mehlquist, from R. *minus* var. *minus* × R. *mucronulatum* 'Cornell Pink', in one case using the Album or white form of *minus*, and in the other the pink. Both have double flowers, giving them a softer look.



Pictured at left is 'April Rose'. Below right is 'April Gem', in this case showing not pure white, but a pinkish form (it could be a mislabelled 'April Mist'):

There are others including 'April Mist' (pink), 'April White', and 'White Surprise', all produced by Dr. Gustav A.L. Mehlquist, a

founding member of the Connecticut Chapter of the ARS. 'Gus' Mehlquist, by

occupation a biologist, produced many hybrids, winning the Society's Gold Award in 1975. He passed away in 1999 at the age of 93, having given us several plants to remember him by.

Both 'April Rose' and 'April Glow' can be found in BC, and are actively propagated by Allouette Nursery. These plants are low growing (3 foot rating at 10 years) and have small leaves, which, in the case of 'April Glow', turn a very nice burnished red in the fall.

April Education Feature - Preparing a Rhododendron Truss - by Karen Shuster

- **1. Select What to Show** (don't be embarrassed something is better than nothing)
 - Know what's typical for this rhododendron
 - A truss from the top usually presents better than one from a side twig or branch
 - Stem must be at least 3" long (or you'll be sorry)
 - Tight is better than too open (no dropping petals!)
 - Water spots on petals is not desirable, but is sometimes unavoidable
 - Leaves are important; rosette should be symmetrical and in good condition
 - A spray should be large enough to make an impression (not always possible)
 - A few unopened flowers are ok
 - Beware of double-trusses
 - No flowers on your plant? Foliage plants is a category
 - Pick a category with not much competition

2. Prepare Your Entry

- Cut early in the day
- Crush the stem
- Place in water right away
 - o Container:
 - florist tubes
 - beer bottles in a 6 pack holder
 - a bucket
 - Water additives:
 - Sprite
 - sugar
 - copper penny
- Tidy the truss
 - You can take away as much as you like, but adding is a no-no
 - Clean the leaves if necessary
 - Leaf-shine is not allowed
 - o Remove bracts (use tweezers)
 - Only single rosette of leaves
 - o Remove bad leaves where feasible
 - o Remove aborted and spent flowers
 - o If a pot plant, clean outside of pot and surface of soil, remove dead twigs (a plastic pot is perfectly acceptable there are no points for a fancy container)

3. Prepare to Enter

- Identify the truss, spray or plant
 - Use alphabetical list
 - o Use schema together with reference books
 - Look at what's on display
 - o Ask a knowledgeable club member
- Choose the appropriate category (e.g., Novice)
- Fill out card top and bottom



Plants in Flower - Rhododendron parmulatum

Rhododendron parmulatum is a seldom encountered species in Section Neriiflora. It was discovered by Kingdon Ward in 1924 growing in very wet conditions on steep slopes, cliffs and rocks at 10,000 to 12,000 feet in SE Tibet. Not surprisingly, the species requires excellent drainage. In the Botanical Garden, a handsome specimen of the cultivar 'Ocelot' (pictured on page 4) was flowering in late April in a lightly shaded part of the David C. Lam Asian Garden. The cultivar won an RHS Award of Merit (AM) in 1977. The **Rhododendron Species Botanical Garden** in Federal Way, Washington (www.rhodygarden.org/), has sold both the species and 'Ocelot'. Check their website for availability and descriptions.
